In 2025, Sourcewise faced a pivotal challenge: the growing demands of a diverse aging population coupled with shifting federal and state policies and investment priorities.

Acknowledging this, we embarked on a journey defined by a renewed sense of purpose and commitment. As the year unfolded, we rallied our resources to meet these demands, focusing intensely on impact and the steadfast support of our community.

Driven by our mission to provide individuals with the tools and resources they need to make informed health and life decisions, we prioritized the needs of our community by fostering independence, strengthening social connections, and proactively addressing the evolving needs of Santa Clara County’s growing population of older adults, adults with disabilities, and their caregivers.

This year was about people, partnerships, and the connective tissue that brings us together.

Highlights of Our Purposeful Year:

- **Aging and Disability Resource Connection:** In partnership with Silicon Valley Independent Living Center (SVILC), we advanced toward establishing a “No Wrong Door” system for long-term services and supports in Santa Clara County by achieving Emerging ADRC status. Our goal is to simplify access to essential services for older adults and individuals with disabilities, ensuring a more coordinated and inclusive care experience.
- **Veteran Directed Care:** Partnered with the Veterans Administration to deliver person-centered care tailored to the Veterans’ unique needs.
- **Partnerships with Managed Care Organizations:** Strengthened collaborations with health plans and hospital systems to bridge gaps and improve outcomes for our community.
- **Expanding Fall Prevention & Home Modification Access:** Increased access to programs that reduce fall risks and enhance home safety, helping older adults remain independent in their homes.
- **Older Adult Digital Link Program Expansion:** Advanced digital tools and training to connect older adults with technology, improving access to health and social services, and reducing isolation.

As we move forward, we remain focused on building a future where older adults, caregivers, and individuals with disabilities thrive in a community that values dignity, independence, and inclusion at every stage of life.

My heartfelt appreciation to our dedicated Board members, Advisory Council, team, volunteers, and community partners for their support in this year. Your commitment makes our work possible.


REALITY OF AGING IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY

Sourcewise, the Area Agency on Aging for Santa Clara County, develops the Area Plan to ensure older adults, caregivers, and people with disabilities have access to the services they need to thrive. This plan reflects our commitment to listening to the community, identifying local needs, and creating programs that empower independence and enhance quality of life.

The Area Plan reveals an aging society. By 2030, adults age 65 and older will make up 26% of Santa Clara County's population. At the state level, older adults will represent 27% of California's population and 23% of the national population. Our county's diversity and high cost of living create added challenges for older adults as they navigate health and life options.

Top Issues Identified by Our Community

Sourcewise exists to support older adults facing complex challenges by empowering them to direct their own care and by developing innovative solutions with our community partners. Aging is difficult, but it doesn't have to be lonely.



NEW PROGRAMS & INITIATIVES

Veteran Directed Care (VDC)



Veteran Directed Care allows Veterans of all ages to receive Home and Community-Based Services in a consumer-directed way, giving them control over their care through a personalized budget and the ability to hire their own workers. This program helps Veterans who need assistance with daily activities or whose caregivers are experiencing burnout, enabling them to remain safely at home or in their community.

This year, we launched the program in partnership with Veterans Affairs Palo Alto Health Care, enrolling 12 Veterans and providing them with the flexibility and support they need. In the upcoming year, we plan to expand the program to the surrounding counties of Santa Cruz, San Benito, San Mateo, and Monterey, increasing accessibility for those who served our country. Sourcewise is committed to supporting and giving back to our Veterans.

Fall Prevention



We help older adults live safely and independently at home for as long as possible through fall prevention strategies and home modifications. Our programs provide personalized services such as grab bars, improved lighting, and accessibility updates to reduce fall risks and promote dignity and autonomy.

This year, we supported 203 older adults with critical home safety improvements and fall prevention education. Our partnership with Habitat for Humanity made essential modifications possible, empowering seniors to remain in their homes longer. Looking ahead, we aim to expand education efforts and secure additional grants to make these services more accessible, ensuring older adults can age safely and confidently.

Emergency Assistance Program (EAP)



Sourcewise's first Emergency Assistance Program was made possible thanks to a \$30,000 grant from SCAN Health plan. From October 2024 through June 2025, Sourcewise served a total of 50 Santa Clara County residents comprised of low-income older adults aged 55+ and caregivers to older adults who received a maximum of \$750 in one-time emergency assistance. Funds were used to assist individuals with emergency payments for food, housing, utilities, and other basic personal necessities such as clothing, durable and medical equipment, medication, and medical bills not covered by health insurance.

"I needed to vacate my apartment but I did not have resources to hire movers. After speaking with Sourcewise, we quickly submitted the paperwork to get things going before the upcoming holiday weekend. Reyna reassured me that she would contact me when she returned after the weekend. And she did...with good news! She quickly sent the payment to the movers so that I could get my move scheduled. I will be forever grateful.

Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC)



In partnership with Sourcewise and the Silicon Valley Independent Living Center (SVILC), ADRC Santa Clara County has built a strong foundation for a No Wrong Door system that connects older adults, individuals with disabilities, and caregivers to long-term services and supports. In its first year—without any dedicated funding—the ADRC updated over 400 resources, trained staff in certified Options Counseling, established HIPAA-compliant data sharing, reached 68 skilled nursing facilities with transition support, and developed quality assurance protocols to guide service delivery.

As we enter Year 2 of our Emerging ADRC status, we aim to expand our reach by leveraging established workflows, creating a Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) network with key community partners, and forming an Advisory Committee to ensure our system reflects the diverse needs of our community. To sustain and grow this transformative work, we invite donors to invest in the future of aging and disability services in Santa Clara County—your support will help us build a more inclusive, accessible, and responsive network for all.

Digital Link



In October 2024, Sourcewise launched the Digital Access Program (DAP) through our Digital Link team, in partnership with the City of San Jose Department of Parks, Recreation, and Neighborhood Services, the San Jose Public Library, the San Jose Public Library Foundation, and with support from the California Department of Aging. DAP is one of six Tech Hubs powered by SJ Access, designed to promote digital inclusion by providing internet access, technology-enabled devices, and digital literacy training.

DAP is hosted at the Roosevelt Community Center, where older adults receive hands-on digital skills training every Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Training is delivered by bilingual members of the Sourcewise Digital Link team, who offer support in Spanish and Vietnamese to ensure accessibility for diverse communities.

Looking ahead to Fiscal Year 2025-2026, Sourcewise will continue the Digital Access Program with a goal of reaching 70 older adults. Additionally, we will launch the Digital Ambassador Program, a pilot initiative that trains older adults to mentor their peers. These ambassadors will help fellow older adults confidently navigate the online world, creating a sustainable model for bridging the digital divide.

“Sourcewise has opened the doors of knowledge to me by helping me to use electronic technology. Modern technology has changed everything drastically, making things easier while saving time and costs. I now can easily converse with my doctor about my health, make appointments, arrange transportation to the doctor’s office, and refill prescriptions. Caregivers

We support caregivers, both paid and unpaid, who provide care to residents of Santa Clara County.



“Through the Caregivers Network at Sourcewise, we were able to hire a caregiver who could give me some respite in caring for my husband who has a neurological disease called Progressive Supranuclear Palsy (PSP). Health, Medical, and Evidence Based

We provide comprehensive case management programs and services through a multidisciplinary care team.

Workforce Development

We support adults 55 or older with the opportunity and support needed to obtain employment.



“As a prior employer, I recall many times discarding an application because the person applying was over-qualified yet lacked current skills. That is an insurmountable problem for an older person who needs or wants to work. The Senior Employment program faces that dilemma head-on by retraining the person who lacks the skill set required in today’s job market. Even the tiniest things such as hitting two spaces after a period and outdated resume formatting is corrected.

COMMUNITY SUCCESS STORIES

Building Trust and Bringing Care to Lisa's Life

Lisa, an elderly woman living with dementia and no nearby family, faced overwhelming challenges. As a Korean-speaking older adult, language barriers added to her isolation and made accessing resources even harder. She struggled to attend medical appointments, experienced frequent falls and hospitalizations, and even spent time in a rehab facility. Basic needs like paying her phone bill, having household essentials, and eating regular meals were unmet. During a home visit, her Care Manager John discovered Lisa lacked items such as toilet paper, cleaning supplies, and even a toothbrush. She only drank water from the kitchen faucet and often skipped meals, though she was hesitant to admit it.

Through the Multipurpose Senior Services Program (MSSP), John began building trust with Lisa through monthly visits and practical support. He helped her apply for a free phone to restore connectivity, used emergency funds to purchase household necessities, and encouraged her to apply for In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS). Initially, Lisa was hesitant to apply for IHSS due to a limited understanding of the program, but after learning about its benefits, she agreed to apply. Soon, she was paired with a caregiver who spoke her native language, Korean—a perfect match. The caregiver prepared delicious Korean meals daily, improving Lisa's comfort and nutrition.

Today, Lisa is safer, connected, and supported. She receives regular care and no longer faces her challenges alone. Lisa expressed deep gratitude for the consistency of her Care Manager and the systems of support put in place. Her story highlights how trust and personalized care can truly transform someone's life. Sourcewise programs such as MSSP prioritize individual choice by aiming to empower older adults like Lisa to age with dignity and security.



Restoring Joy: How Nilda Reclaims Her Garden Through Intergenerational Support

At 91 years old, Nilda lives alone and cherishes her garden, a space that brings her peace and happiness. She has been a Sourcewise participant for some time, but little did we know she loves to garden. Unfortunately, multiple health conditions make it impossible for her to maintain her yard, leaving her disconnected from something she loves. Through the Intergenerational Activities Program, Sourcewise partnered with San Jose State University (SJSU) summer interns to help Nilda reclaim her outdoor space. On a hot summer day, the interns spend three hours clearing her yard and removing potential tripping hazards, ensuring it is safe for her to enjoy again.

The transformation was immediate. With her garden accessible, Nilda eagerly began planting summer vegetables, which also led to improvements to her mobility. During our last check-in, she proudly showed off sprouting zucchinis, tomato plants, and vibrant blooming flowers, a testament to how a little support can restore independence and joy. Nilda's story reminds us that small acts of care can make a big difference in the lives of older adults.





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
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
